Principal's Letter

Dear Peirce Families,

Haven't the autumn leaves and most of the weather been particularly beautiful this year? (We will discount the snow/ice from last Sunday's Patriot's game.) Of all the seasons, for many people autumn is the favorite. There is a feel about it, a distinct and undeniable aura that surrounds it. Those leaves are part of it. What color, what artistry! What a refreshing change from oppressively hot afternoons and sweltering nights! Then there is a helpful return to routine as the school starts. Certainly, that has been true for Peirce. The children have settled in nicely; our kindergartners are taking enormous pride in knowing all parts of Peirce. They went on their first field trip riding in the "big" yellow bus to Drumlin Farms. We soon will conclude our first month of full-day kindergarten. Over the course of the past few weeks, the kindergarten teachers have told me how pleased they are about the opportunity to have one-half of their classes in the afternoons for two days each week. Coupled with this is the opportunity for the kindergarten students to have lunch in their classroom. The two classes dine together. That is quite an event, as you might imagine.

Once there is a chill in the air, families immediately begin to wonder about procedures concerning school closing or delayed opening due to inclement weather. Beginning in 1992, the school system instituted a policy of delayed openings. Should there be a delayed opening, students will be expected to go to their bus stops or leave their house (if they walk to school) one (or two) hours after their regularly scheduled time. The bus companies and crossing guards will know about the delay. More information will be forthcoming from the school system. If a storm occurs during the school day, school will ordinarily remain in session. We now have emergency calling lines which can update you. At present we have 15 families that have not given us updated contact phone numbers. We need your yellow sheet which tells us your phone numbers and who your back-up person is in case of an emergency.

We begin our parent/ teacher conferences the week of October 26. If you have not signed up for a conference, please do. Our teachers will want to learn about your child from you and will want to present some preliminary data about your child's entry into school. This is a very important time of the year when together you can set some goals for your child's learning. Our staff will also tell you that we use various tools to assess your children's growth and development, allowing us to plan instruction that meets their needs and illuminates their progress towards the academic and social goals of their grade.

I want to thank you for the consistent follow-through you are giving to your child(ren) taking responsibility for their homework, remembering their instruments, finding their library books, and remembering their snacks. This truly gives the message to the children that personal responsibility for their school life is very important. At this moment, we have seen an improvement in students being on time (so far). We keep careful attendance and punctuality records. Students need to be in their classrooms by no later than 8:35AM.

On an entirely different note, it was great seeing so many folks at the fabulous Mystery Dinner last Saturday evening. A huge thank you goes to the committee chairs, their committee, and to the numerous hosts who opened their homes.
